LIGHTS UP

CAPTION: CHRISTMAS DAY

LIGHTS UP

Two children Mary and June runs onstage. They are crying.

Their Father John enters.

JOHN: What's going on girls?

MARY: Dad you promised.

JOHN: What are you talking about?

JUNE: You didn't put out the stockings.

MARY: Santa Claus has come and he left nothing. No gifts.

JUNE: Our Christmas is ruined.

MARY: Why Dad? Why?

Pause.

JOHN: I did put out the stockings. From the day before Christmas Eve.

MARY: Well there is no stocking and there are no gifts.

JUNE: Our Christmas is ruined.

Their mother Anna enters.

ANNA: What's going on John?

JOHN: I think someone stole Christmas!

LIGHTS OUT

CAPTION: THREE DAYS BEFORE CHRISTMAS DAY

LIGHTS UP

Mary, June, Paul and Samuel are onstage. Paul and Samuel are the kids from next door.

PAUL: This is gonna be the best Christmas ever.

SAMUEL: I hope Santa Claus got my list early.

MARY: He better. I have an iPod and iPhone on my list.

JUNE: Tommy Hilfiger top, bottom and shoes for me. I'm changing my look for the new year.

PAUL: X-box, a touch screen LG cookie and a Toshiba Satellite State of the art laptop is just a few of the things I am expecting this year.

Pause.

PAUL: What about you Samuel?

SAMUEL: I just need a car.

MARY: You are only ten. Whatcha doing with a car?

SAMUEL: I'll have my license in six years.

JUNE: Be realistic boy. Santa Claus aint bringing a car for no ten year old.

SAMUEL: But I've been good. I tried to brush my teeth and take a bath at least once a day. I help my mom with chores once a week..and I helped an old lady cross the street in June.

MARY: Wow. Impressive Sam. Maybe Santa will bring you one of those cars you pull back and let go.

PAUL: If your that lucky.

SAMUEL: You guys are always making fun of me.

JUNE: That's cuz your head is stuck in the clouds.

SAMUEL: We'll see who gets the last laugh this Christmas.

John enters holding decorations.

JOHN: Okay. Which one a you kids gonna help me put up the decorations?

Pause. No response.

JOHN: Which one a you kids gonna help me put up the decorations for a fee?

MARY: The going rate is ten to one.

JOHN: Ten dollars for one hour?

JUNE: Take it or leave it dad.

Pause.

JOHN: You guys drive a hard bargain but since I can't do this myself...we have a deal.

MARY: And Dad...you promised to put up the stockings last night. Santa is coming in three days.

JOHN: Yeah, doesn't that mean I have three days to do it?

JUNE: Dad, you procrastinate too much.

The kids take the decorations and exit leaving John slightly speechless.

JOHN: That sounds like something your mother would say. (sighs) Kids!

CAPTION: TWO DAYS BEFORE CHRISTMAS DAY

LIGHTS UP

Anna & John are onstage going over their daughters Christmas list.

JOHN: Have you seen this list?

ANNA: Yes I have.

JOHN: We can't afford to buy these this year.

ANNA: I know. But they will be devastated if they wake up on Christmas morning and there are no gifts.

JOHN: I don't even know what an IPOD is! And the prices on these items is ridiculous. If we buy anything from this list we're gonna be flat broke.

ANNA: We can't spoil their Christmas.

JOHN: When did Christmas become about buying expensive gifts? That's not how we were grown.

ANNA: Our kids are born into a new generation. The traditional celebrations don't appeal very much to them.

John gets up. He's frustrated and confused.

A few other parents come over.

Jack & Jill, Stacy and Mark & David and Marsha. They are all holding lists.

DAVID: What's wrong with kids these days? An x-box? Do you guys have any idea how much that thing costs.

STACY: This is a catastrophe.

MARK: Our own children are gonna force us into bankruptcy.

JACK: It's hard enough already to meet the bills.

JILL: Rent and food alone takes half our pay-check. The car payments...utility bills.

MARSHA: We have a problem.

JOHN: How do we fix this?

Pause.

ANNA: That's the million dollar question now isn't it?

DAVID: Well we need to figure something out real fast. These kids have no mercy.

Pause.

JOHN: I might just have an idea.
